

Meet Bahir: Finding Confidence in the Classroom

When three-year-old Bahir first stepped into UCC's Ricardo Diaz Early Learning Academy, he was shy and cautious, clinging to his mother's side. Coming from a large, Spanish-speaking family, the transition to an English-speaking classroom felt overwhelming. Though his older brothers spoke English, his parents did not, making the experience even more intimidating. Because of this, UCC has at least one bilingual staff in each classroom and utilizes curriculum designed to support English Language Learners which includes vocabulary words labeled in both English and Spanish throughout the classroom, and using sound repetition.

While his English was improving, his teachers recognized his continued hesitation in the classroom and took a creative and nurturing approach. They discovered his passion for cars, fire trucks, and playing doctor, weaving these interests into classroom activities. Through engaging dramatic play, Bahir slowly opened up—each interaction building his confidence and excitement for learning. But the support didn't stop there. UCC stepped in to help his entire family, providing food, clothing, and school supplies to ease financial struggles. His teacher even sent home special winter break activities, ensuring his learning continued beyond the classroom.



Our year-round programs, including Head Start and Early Head Start, nurture social, emotional, and intellectual growth for children from six weeks to four-years old. To meet the growing demand, we are expanding into the Burnham Park neighborhood, ensuring more families have access to exceptional early learning experiences that build a strong foundation for lifelong success.

Through group seminars and one-on-one counseling, UCC helps more families and individuals achieve the dream of homeownership, setting themselves and their families on the path for financial stability for generations to come.

Meet Alandra: Finding Stability and a Bright Future

Alandra dreamed of providing her first child with more than just a place to live—she wanted a true home, a space of stability and belonging. Renting for years on Milwaukee's southside, she knew it was time to take the next step and turned to UCC's First-Time Homebuyer Program for guidance.

First, Alandra gained crucial knowledge about financial preparation, working with lenders, and navigating the homebuying process.

Sessions empowered her to move forward with confidence.

From there, she worked closely with her Homebuyer

Counselor, who provided one-on-one support, guiding her through every challenge. With the support of the program, Alandra secured a \$10,000 first-time homebuyer grant, allowing her to make important updates to her new home.

Alandra achieved her dream—closing on her first home in a safe, welcoming neighborhood. Now, she is preparing the space for her child's arrival, creating a warm and nurturing environment for the future. More than just a home, this is an investment in her family's stability, financial security, and long-term success.

UCC is transforming lives through compassionate treatment and recovery services for individuals facing substance use disorders.

Comprehensive residential programs provide 24-hour, personalized care—including counseling, medication-assisted treatment, and creative therapies—designed to nurture healing for men, women, and families alike.

Flexible outpatient and day treatment services offer dynamic group and individual counseling, life skills education, and mental health support to bolster each client's journey toward lasting recovery.

UCC's Recovery Support Coordination connects clients with essential health education and primary care, ensuring a seamless continuum of support that inspires hope and resilience.

Meet Molly: Triumph Over Addiction and a Journey to Self-Discovery

Before enrolling at UCC's residential treatment program, the grip of Fentanyl-addiction controlled Molly's daily life.

"Due to the mess I made of things, I knew I had to change in order to find a life worth living again." UCC was the lifeline that propelled Molly through a haze of numbness and desperate cycle she was in. Through UCC's residential treatment program, she worked with counselors to confront the choices she made under the influence of drugs.

It wasn't all smooth sailing. Every day in addiction and every day in recovery had its challenges and rewards. Amidst the struggle, a newfound identity emerged—one of strength, bravery, beauty, and kindness. With her health restored and relationships rekindled, Molly cherishes the discovery of her true essence—a journey to self-love and acceptance.

Our **Senior Center** offers a vibrant, culturally sensitive space where older Latino adults enjoy nourishing meals, engaging activities, and socialization. The **Adult Day Center** and **Community Care Family Care Program** provide personalized, home-like support for frail elders and those with disabilities, ensuring compassionate care and respite. With specialized services like our bilingual **Memory Clinic** and **affordable senior housing**, UCC creates a nurturing environment that empowers seniors to thrive and embrace each day with confidence. **Transportation services** to and from our centers helps seniors maintain independence and continue attending the Adult Day Center and Senior Center with reliable transportation.

Meet Juanita: A Century of Wisdom and Community

Juanita, a cherished member of the United Community Center Senior Center, recently celebrated an incredible milestone—her 100th birthday. She started attending the UCC Senior Center in March 2010, and has since become an integral part of the community, coming every day to engage in activities and connect with others.

Even at 100 years old, she remains full of energy and enthusiasm, embodying the spirit of an active and engaged life. Staff members admire her energy and dedication, noting how her health has improved through the center's nutrition and fitness programs. Her involvement demonstrates how seniors can thrive, share their talents, and build meaningful relationships at UCC's Senior Center.

Empowering Healthy Communities: Community Health Research & Athletics

UCC is dedicated to advancing community health and wellness by promoting active lifestyles, transformative athletic opportunities, and supporting health research.

UCC schools have **on-site health clinics,** in conjunction with Sixteenth Street Community Health Centers, to remove barriers in accessing preventative and acute health care for students and their families.

UCC's Athletics Program engages youth and families in activities that promote fitness, teamwork, and lifelong healthy habits. From FIT KIDS for elementary students to a variety of sports including soccer, basketball, volleyball, and the Badges for Baseball program, participants develop athletic skills while reinforcing positive values. A flagship athletic activity is the UCC Boxing Program. Through rigorous training, participants gain not only boxing fundamentals but also confidence, perseverance, and a strong work ethic—essential skills for success in life.

The Community Health & Research Program partners with leading universities and local organizations to conduct community-based research and health prevention initiatives, specifically addressing health disparities and improving outcomes for Milwaukee's Latino population.

Meet Sophia:

From Stress to Success

Sophia, a 7th grader at Bruce-Guadalupe Middle School (BGMS), has been part of UCC Schools since kindergarten. Though she earned good grades, last year her science teacher noticed she often shut down in class, struggling with stress, especially during tests like the Measure of Academic Progress (MAP) exams.

Concerned, her teachers, specialists, and parents united to create a personalized support plan. They introduced calming techniques, structured breaks, snacks, rewards, and regular check-ins to help her build resilience. Progress was slow, with setbacks along the way, but Sophia's determination grew. By year's end, she no longer gave up—tackling challenges independently with newfound confidence.


This year, Sophia continues to thrive. A teacher notes, "She's learned to manage stress, and it's transformed her academic performance." Her hard work paid off—her MAP scores soared, with an 8-point gain in reading and 7-point gain in math. More importantly, she is happier, more self-assured, and embracing challenges.

Sophia's journey is a testament to BGMS's whole-child approach—where school and family collaborate to nurture academic success, emotional well-being, and personal growth. With her teachers and family cheering her on, Sophia is looking ahead, ready to dream big.
